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THE WBIF AND EU ENLARGEMENT

The Western Balkans
Investment Framework (WBIF)
supports socio-economic
development and EU accession
through the provision of technical
assistance and investment grants
to strategic infrastructure projects.

The successful Enlargement policy has seen EU membership grow from the initial 6 to 28, inclusively by means of a historic expansion in 2004/2007 which marked the end of decades of division in Europe. The integration of the countries of Central and Eastern Europe has shown that enlargement benefits the EU as a whole, and allows it to be better positioned to face global challenges.

Acting upon the Zagreb and Thessaloniki Summits in 2000 and 2003, which reaffirmed the European perspective of the countries of the Western Balkans, the EU shows continued commitment to the region, as well as to stability and transformation powers. This commitment was further demonstrated in 2017 with the signature of the Transport Community Treaty; and the support to a Multiannual Action Plan to implement a Regional Economic Area fostering trade and investment.

The accession process requires substantial reforms and investments to be performed by the candidate and potential candidate countries. In 2009, the EU pooled resources with international financial institutions, donors, and the governments of the Western Balkan countries to create the Western Balkans Investment Framework, a regional tool to support the reform process and ultimately EU Enlargement.

The WBIF supports socio-economic development and EU accession across the

region through the provision of technical assistance grants, and, increasingly, co-financing grants offered to strategic projects in the energy, environment, social, transport and enterprise development sectors. The WBIF seeks to maximise the impact of grant financing by joining forces with financial institutions providing loans.

WBIF resources are funded by Bilateral Donors as well as from the European Union's Instrument for Pre-Accession (IPA II). For the period 2014-2020, the WBIF benefits from increased IPA contributions as compared to the period 2009-2013, while existing and new Bilateral Donors continue to pledge additional resources. This allows the WBIF to continue the provision of technical assistance and to increase its project financing activities.

In recognition of the specificities of the Western Balkans, the WBIF particularly supports projects that enhance regional or territorial cooperation and connectivity. It has enabled an investment volume of more than €16 billion across eligible sectors in the region. Grant support has reached €772 million, through technical assistance for project preparation and implementation as well as direct contribution to works and supplies.

The WBIF has become a major source of finance in the region, with a total contribution of €180 million through 33 grants in 2017.

FOREWORD





I am very pleased to introduce the 2017 Annual Report of the Western Balkans Investment Framework.

The WBIF has been in action for eight years, since 2009. It has become the principal forum of cooperation on infrastructure development in the region. With grant support from the European Commission, and twenty Bilateral Donors, the WBIF accounts for 156 projects with a total investment value in excess of €16 billion, an average of circa €100 million per project.

The WBIF is delivering tangible support to the Connectivity Agenda. This brings the region closer together and it also brings the Western Balkans closer to the EU. Since 2015 alone, the European Commission has allocated more than €500 million in investment grants from the EU Pre-Accession Instrument (IPA), to 20 connectivity projects. The WBIF lending partners have advanced a further €690 million. Construction has started on four of the eight projects endorsed at the WB6 Summit in Vienna in 2015, and I personally attended two ground-breaking ceremonies. These were a major road bridge over the Sava River linking Bosnia and Herzegovina to Croatia (the EU), and a grid section of the Trans-Balkan Electricity Corridor in Montenegro. The EU's support has

already generated a total of €1.4 billion in investment which has created more than 20,000 jobs.

In this context, I also welcome two other outstanding regional achievements of 2017. First, the signing of the Transport Community Treaty, a significant encouragement to a better planning of transport investments, while also streamlining procedures (for example quicker border crossings). Second, the agreement on a Regional Economic Area at the Trieste Western Balkans Summit, which will boost business, creating jobs and greater career opportunities. Both will link with the WBIF's substantial investment in infrastructure, and help the region address the growth, competitiveness, and employment-related challenges it currently

The WRIF has also become an umbrella investment forum for clean energy in the region, with a €50 million grant allocated in 2016, for example, to regional energy efficiency and renewable energy schemes; furthermore, it has provided a €48 million arant to the Western Balkan Enterprise Development and Innovation Facility (WB EDIF) to boost entrepreneurial capacity and open new financing opportunities for SMEs, facilitating also the approval of €12 million

in investment grants for two environment projects. These were made possible by the Bilateral Donors' pledges to the WBIF Joint Fund in December 2016, and will contribute to the construction of a new wastewater treatment plant in Podgorica as well as to the upgrade of water and wastewater treatment facilities in Belgrade. I would therefore like to express my sincere thanks to the Bilateral Donors for their increased participation in the WBIF.

Above all, I would like to thank all WBIF partners, beneficiaries, financial institutions, and donors for their critical contribution to our common objective. namely a more prosperous and better integrated Western Balkans, on its path to the EU. The mutual benefits arisen for the citizens of the region and those of the European Union are thus becoming indubitable.

I look forward to an exciting 2018 where we can rely on the WBIF and our partners to underpin, amongst others, the Commission's strategy for the Western Balkans, in February, the EU-Western Balkans Summit in Sofia, in May, and this summer's London Summit for the region.

ABOUT THE WBIF

The WBIF is a unique and successful cooperation platform uniting beneficiaries, donors, and lenders.

Building on existing initiatives of the European Commission (EC) and the IFIs, the WBIF was jointly launched in 2009 by the EC, partner IFIs and several donor countries to enhance harmonisation and cooperation in investments for the socioeconomic development of the Western Balkan accession countries.

The WBIF is a multifaceted and elaborate cooperation structure supporting infrastructure investment, private sector development and energy efficiency. It contributes to the European perspective of the Western Balkans by supporting investment projects that improve competitiveness and growth, while reinforcing regional cooperation and connectivity. Eligible sectors include energy, environment, social, transport, private sector development, and, since December 2017, digital infrastructure.

While infrastructure projects are the core of the WBIF, a holistic perspective of all areas improving the "business-enabling environment" has grown in importance. Its strategic orientation extends to energy efficiency and renewables (REEP, GGF), as well as to private sector development (WB EDIF, EFSE).

The WBIF blends grants and loans through the Joint Grant and Joint Lending Facilities to provide financing and technical assistance to strategic investments. The €441 million European Western Balkans Joint Fund (EWBJF) pools most donor funds. Grant funds worth €772 million have been allocated for WBIF operations resulting in potential loans of €10.4 billion.

The WBIF encourages national ownership, strategic prioritisation of investments, sharing of expertise, cooperation among all stakeholders, and transparency.

CO-INVESTING IN KEY REGIONAL NETWORKS

Co-financing of infrastructure projects under the WBIF enables cohesion and synergy among stakeholders and leverages resources for the greater benefit of the beneficiary countries.

The Western Balkan countries face various challenges on their path towards sustainable economic growth. A few are, however, considerable: transportation bottlenecks, difficulties in crossing

borders, power failures. These negatively impact employment and trade, diminishing the competitiveness of local economies.

2015 - 2017 Investment Projects Co-financed by the WBIF



In 2015, the European Commission set aside up to €1 billion in grants until 2020, from the EU Pre-Accession Instrument. to support the Connectivity Agenda. This initiative is part of the EU Enlargement Strategy and seeks to support the development of safe and efficient transport routes as well as of more secure and affordable energy supply. The grants will leverage €4 billion in investments and create more than 45,000 jobs. Envisaged benefits for the region are enhanced competitiveness and welfare, attracting investment, creating jobs, and generating new businesses and personal opportunities. In addition, the initiative strengthens dialogue on mutual growth opportunities and supports the development of a regional economic area, thus fostering good neighbourly relations in the Western Balkans.

Improving connectivity within the Western Balkans, as well as between the Western Balkans and the European Union, constitutes a key factor for sustainable growth in the region. The Western Balkans Six (WB6) have made the Connectivity Agenda one of their highest priorities, with a special emphasis on the preparation and financing of concrete regional infrastructure investment projects and on the implementation of technical standards and reform measures (e.g.: aligning/simplifying border crossing procedures, railway reforms, information systems, road safety and maintenance schemes, unbundling and third-party access).

The WBIF implements this initiative through investment grants. Over the past three years, the WBIF has committed more than €347.5 million in co-financing

grants to thirteen connectivity projects in the region with a cumulative investment value in excess of €979 million. Its partner Financial Institutions have extended €511 million in loans to support the investment costs, complementing national contributions.

The implementation of these projects is progressing well with all financing agreements now in place, four projects under construction in 2017, and three more projects planned to start construction in

The connectivity projects financed by the WBIF in the region will result in the construction and/or upgrade of more than 450 km of high voltage electricity lines and associated substations, as well as rehabilitation and/or construction of 265 km of railway lines and the associated train stations on the Orient/East-Med Corridor in the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia, Kosovo, Montenegro and Serbia, and on the Mediterranean Corridor in Albania. In addition, two modern border crossing points and two new bridges will be built in Bosnia and Herzegovina on the Mediterranean Corridor (Vc) and the Core Network,

respectively.

These investments in infrastructure complemented by comprehensive set of reform measures designed to allow for their efficient operation and maximise their benefit to which the Western Balkan countries committed in 2015. The WBIF also considers progress on these connectivity reform measures.

The connectivity effort is already bearing fruit, for instance, the Turkish operator Turkrail has recently announced plans to launch a regular container service to Austria via Serbia and use the upgraded rail Orient/East-Med Corridor.

After nearly a decade of negotiations, the Treaty establishing the Transport Community was signed at the WB6 Summit in Trieste, on 12 July 2017, between five Western Balkan partners and the EU and, on 18 September 2017, by Bosnia and Herzegovina. The Treaty establishes the conditions for new dynamics in the cooperation between the EU and the region. Its key objective is a deeper integration of the Western Balkans with the EU transport market towards common standards, network efficiency, and service quality offered to people and businesses.

SUSTAINABLE ENERGY

In 2017 the WBIF began acting as an umbrella for the European Union's support to energy transition in the Western Balkans. Activities in this field include policy dialogue, technical assistance and financing and they target the renewable energy sector (RE) as well as the energy efficiency sector (EE). They are exercised either directly or through intermediaries and are supported by cumulative EC commitments in excess of €150 million.

The two main instruments are the **Regional Energy Efficiency Programme (REEP and its extension REEP Plus)** and the **Green for Growth Fund (GGF)**. Both received additional funding commitments in late 2016, and started their deployment in 2017. In addition, the **Regional Strategy for Sustainable Hydropower in the Western Balkans**, a study funded by the WBIF since 2016 and implemented by IPF3, came to fruition in 2017.

REEP AND REEP PLUS





REEP is an integrated package of finance, technical assistance and policy dialogue, implemented jointly by the EBRD and the Energy Community Secretariat, which aims at creating a sustainable energy efficiency market in the region. The Programme

was extended by three years in 2016, adding a specific objective to address the challenges of the residential sector.

REEP's ESCO support and policy dialogue activities made good progress during the year: REEP is active in all countries and two thirds of the policy deliverables due under the programme have now been submitted and adopted by the national authorities. This year, the policy work focused on supporting transposition of key EPBD articles that are recognised as a driver for mobilising

investment in the renovation of public and private buildings. ESCO projects' preparation activities are making a mark, particularly in street lighting in Serbia (where approved ESCO projects account for a third of the national PPP pipeline) and in Bosnia and Herzegovina, in district heating.

REEP's financing activities are either intermediated by commercial banks for smaller projects or processed directly by the EBRD. So far, nine participating banks have lent €75 million to 290 projects, meeting or exceeding all targets, while 7 projects have been approved for direct lending of €32 million. In 2017, two new intermediated facilities were added. One is managed by the EBRD and targets residential EE through nine commercial banks in four countries. The other is managed by KfW and targets SMEs and the public sector through three banks in three countries.

Eminent - Energy and cost savings in Serbian fashion industry (a WeBSEFF investment)

Eminent Ltd was launched in the 1990s as a small garment manufacture and has become a leader in the regional fashion industry, with more than 60 stores across Serbia, Montenegro and Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The owners have recently invested in modern equipment, €231,120, which allows the company to decrease its energy costs by €36,000 per year; the energy savings alone will help repay the investment in 6.5 years.

The equipment was purchased through a financing package from the EBRD and the EU under the Western Balkans Sustainable Energy Financing Facility (WeBSEFF).



GREEN FOR GROWTH FUND (GGF)



GGF is the first specialised fund to advance EE and RE in Southeast Europe and beyond. Initiated by the European

Investment Bank and KfW Development Bank, GGF is an innovative public-private partnership established to reduce energy consumption and CO2 emissions. GGF provides refinancing to Financial Institutions to enhance their participation in the EE and RE sectors, and also makes direct investments in RE projects. Activities are supported by a Technical Assistance Facility.

GGF is active in all six countries through partner banks and has supported so far 13,500 borrowers with loans in excess of €150 million. The mix of activities varies country to country. RE is strong in Albania; buildings lead in Bosnia and Herzegovina, Kosovo, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia and Montenegro while buildings and the commercial sector are strong in Serbia.

In 2017, GGF secured a strong position in EE housing improvement microfinance in Kosovo with three new investments. Active cooperation in Serbia (5 partner banks) continued with a new loan to partner Halkbank targeting residential EE measures. RE finance was extended to two wind parks, one directly and one through Unicredit. The TA Facility focused on EE awareness campaigns such as the "Energy Doctor" in Montenegro and on due diligence support to partner banks for RE projects.

THE REGIONAL STRATEGY FOR SUSTAINABLE HYDROPOWER

Hydropower plays a significant role in electricity production in the Western Balkans, with over 8,600 MW installed capacity, nearly half of all regional generation capacity, and more than 95% of total RE capacities in place. Hydropower development should be one element, among other RE sources and the improvement of EE, of a broader strategy intended to decarbonise the power sector and achieve binding renewable energy targets, while implementing strong policies to manage energy demand.

The WBIF has supported extensive work to propose a regional, sustainable approach to existing and future capacities. Due consideration has been given to competing water uses, climate

pattern changes, potential impacts on the environment and on communities, and transboundary aspects in compliance with the EU acquis and applicable international conventions as well as best practices in this sector.


In 2017, the study resulted in a final report supported by eight background reports, a document setting out principles for sustainable hydropower development in the Western Balkans, and one presenting a list of potential rehabilitation and greenfield projects specifying how they should be approached. Both documents will be proposed for endorsement in 2018 at a WB6 Energy and Environment Ministers' Meeting.

WB EDIF: BUILDING THE FUTURE OF SMES IN THE WESTERN BALKANS





The Western Balkans Enterprise Development & Innovation Facility (WB EDIF) was launched in 2013 with the purpose of providing financing and business support to SMEs in the Western Balkans. By supporting SMEs and the infrastructure surrounding them, WB EDIF seeks to contribute to the overall growth and development of the Western Balkan economies proper.

Being a Platform of cooperation between the EU, major bilateral and International Financial Institutions, and the Western Balkan beneficiaries coordinated by the EIF, WB EDIF's mission is to address major gaps in accessing finance for SMEs at all stages of development, from pre-seed and seed all the way to more developed SMEs seeking expansion capital.

In launching such an ambitious project, it was vital to involve a multitude of International Financial Institutions to build on their expertise, as well as to bring in the local and regional perspective by sharing ownership with representation from the countries themselves.


The total funding resources of WB EDIF amount to €245.6 million, out of which €120.3 million have been contributed by the EU. Together with new funding approved in 2017, the Serbian and the Youth Employment window of the Guarantee Facility under the EIF, lending instrument under the EBRD, and the Investment Readiness extension under the World Bank Group, these resources could leverage up to €650 million of financing and support measures made available to SMEs in the Western Balkans.

As of June 2017, €197.6 million has already been deployed via financial instruments through which 2,076 SMEs have been financed and 32,344 jobs have been supported.

WB EDIF is constantly adapting itself to the needs of the Western Balkan economies. Further financial instruments will be deployed in 2018, among which the Guarantee Facility for Serbia and the Youth Employment Guarantee Facility at regional level, both implemented by the EIF, as well as a lending instrument implemented by the EBRD.

In order to ensure a holistic approach to private sector development, WB EDIF also houses a wide range of support mechanisms which work together with the financial instruments to enhance the emergence and growth of innovative and highpotential SMEs in the region, such as Triple Helix Partnership and the EU Small Business Act run by the OECD, REPARIS, Venture Capital Ecosystem and Investment Readiness Programme run by the World Bank Group, Advice for Small Businesses run by the EBRD and a number of horizontal support and targeted technical assistance actions managed by the EIB.

Shumolli - Bringing valuable skills home (supported by the WB EDIF Guarantee Facility)

A native of Kosovo, Ejup Shumolli, learned most of what he knows about his trade in Switzerland but returned to Kosovo to start a factory that produces high-quality vinyl windows and doors. His products are unique because he uses Inoutic, a German material which is well known for its superb thermal insulation and moisture protection.

Today, Shumolli is a well-established company that sells its products in the city of Ferizaj and even exports them to Switzerland; the name is also a familiar brand that has become synonymous with quality and value in the market. Mr. Shumolli is using a loan of €100,000 supported by the WB EDIF and disbursed by ProCredit Bank, to purchase high-end machinery to streamline and increase productivity and efficiency. All this brings him closer to his ambitious business goal of capturing a significant share of both the domestic and foreign markets for his products.

The WBIF is a unique platform for effective cooperation and support, enabling investments in key infrastructure in the region, but more importantly, forging cooperation between its countries and people. To Sweden, the relationship with the Western Balkan countries has always been very important. Over the years, Sweden has formed strong ties to the region and I would like to start by reaffirming our commitment to the region as well as to the Western Balkans Investment Framework.

The EU accession process is an important driver for the development of the region and is central to Sweden's cooperation with the Western Balkan countries. Here, respect for human rights including gender equality and the rule of law come at the fore of our engagement. Sweden also supports enhanced economic integration with the EU and market economydevelopment. oriented Improved environment and implementation of the EU environmental acquis is another priority for our support to the region. In recent years Sweden has stepped up its engagement in the WBIF, leading up to its role of Steering Committee (SC) Co-chair in 2017. Building on the work initiated under our predecessor, Norway, the Bilateral Donors have continued their efforts towards enabling the cofinancing of environment and social projects, alongside the important energy and transport projects, which are given priority under the Connectivity Agenda. To this end, in 2017, Sweden pledged a new contribution of €4 million, which together with the other Bilateral Donors' pledges amounted to a total of over €10 million in new bilateral contributions to the WBIF

On June 14 and 15, Sweden hosted the 16th WBIF Steering Committee meeting at Sida in Stockholm. During the meeting, a €9 million investment grant was approved for the construction of a new wastewater treatment plant in Podgorica, Montenegro, the first WBIF investment grant for an environment project. Furthermore, during the 17th

Steering Committee meeting in Frankfurt in December 2017, a second environment investment grant, Makis Water and Wastewater Facilities in Belgrade, Serbia, was approved, in amount of €3 million. In addition, the Bilateral Donors' contributions have supported important projects through technical assistance.

The WBIF is a well-functioning blending mechanism for infrastructure investment in energy, environment, social, and transport. Sweden is particularly pleased to have contributed to a more even spread of financing resources across sectors, welcomes the increased role of the Bilateral Donors, and will continue to support the socio-economic development and the path to EU accession of the Western Balkan countries, both as part of the WBIF and independently.

Finally, I would like to thank all the stakeholders for making 2017 a successful and innovative year for the WBIF and to wish the incoming 2018 Co-chair, France, all the best.

THE BILATERAL DONOR COMMUNITY

Bilateral Donors are a vital cornerstone of the WBIF. They contribute financial resources, advice on operations, and actively participate in WBIF's governance, in particular through a rotating cochairing system of the WBIF Steering Committee.


Bilateral Donors' contributions have now reached €75.4 million, including €70.2 million in direct contributions to WBIF's European Western Balkans Joint Fund and €5.2 million transferred from the EBRD Western Balkan Fund (WBF) at the inception of the WBIF.

Following the impressive pledges of 2016 (€11.4 million), the Bilateral Donors pledged another €10.6 million in 2017. Traditional main contributors in 2017 were (in alphabetic order), Austria, Germany, Norway and Sweden, with Luxembourg and Slovenia also joining the list of active donors.

These increased contributions by the Bilateral Donors reaffirm their interest in funding WBIF investment grants in the environment and social sectors, thereby complementing the European Commission's focus on energy and transport under the Connectivity Agenda. Thus, the 17th WBIF Steering Committee approved an environment project cofinancing grant, the upgrade of the Makis Water and Wastewater Facilities in Belgrade, by Bilateral Donor contributions. In addition, the Bilateral Donors, alongside the European Commission, continue to finance technical assistance grants for the preparation and implementation of projects in all sectors.

Following the overhaul of the WBIF founding documents in 2016, the Bilateral Donors are closely involved in the governance and operations of the WBIF.

The diagram shows the main structures of the WBIF Governance. The Bilateral Donors are involved, and kept abreast of all developments, at all three main Governance levels.

In the run-up to the PFG meetings, the Bilateral Donors' representative (the WBIF SC Co-chair) participates as observer in the Paris Group meetings. Through the PFG, the Bilateral Donors review and recommend TA and investment grant applications for approval by the Steering Committee. Overall, they are actively involved in the potential co-financing of environment and social projects and in the approval of all grant requests for technical assistance.

KFW: NEW PARTNER ORGANISATION – VISION, FOCUS, AND EXPECTATIONS

In June 2017, the WBIF Steering Committee welcomed the KfW Development Bank as a partner organisation, alongside the European Commission, the Council of Europe Development Bank, the European Bank for Reconstruction and Development, and the European Investment Bank.

The KfW is one of the world's leading and most experienced promotional banks. As an integral part of the KfW Group, the KfW Development Bank carries out Germany's Financial Cooperation with developing and emerging countries on behalf of the Federal Government. The KfW and its staff at the head office in Germany and in about 70 local offices cooperate with partners all over the world. The KfW has been supporting the German Federal Government to achieve its goals in development policy and international development cooperation for more than 50 years. In this regard, the KfW is an experienced bank and a development institution with financing expertise, being also an expert well-versed in development policy with many years of national and international experience.

Since 2008, the cooperation of the EU with

the KfW has further intensified, additionally to the continued support on behalf of the German Government.

BENEFICIARY OVERVIEW





ALBANIA

The WBIF has supported investments estimated at €1.7 billion across all eligible sectors through 25 projects. The value of signed loans has reached €426 million for a total of 14 projects.

The country has benefitted from **34 grants** with an overall value of **€103.3 million** that cover both technical assistance and investment works. Five grants for technical assistance (**€**4.8 million) for infrastructure developments in the energy, environment and transport sectors were approved in 2017.

The WBIF has been instrumental in ensuring access to continuous water supply and electricity, modern sanitation services, better schools and health infrastructure, competitive energy sources, safe and efficient transport routes and seaports.

Economic recovery continued in 2017 with growth projected at 3.2% for 2017-2019 driven by private investments and private consumption. The country is implementing a broad reform programme to revitalise growth and job creation, while advancing the EU accession agenda. Continued fiscal consolidation and other reform efforts are expected to gradually reduce the debt-to-GDP ratio below 60% of GDP by 2021.

Investment prioritisation through NIC and SPP and WBIF support for project preparation and co-financing grants are essential in the current fiscal context.

Skavica Hydro Power Plant / 2017

Electricity generation in Albania is 100% based on hydro resources. The country continues to be a net importer of electricity, with production dominated by the public sector. To increase energy security and mitigate the risk of floods downstream of the existing cascade of hydro power plants (HPPs) on the Drin River, two new HPPs have been recommended to be constructed: 50 MW HPP at Katundi i Ri and 120 MW HPP at Skavica.

In 2017, the WBIF has approved a €1.5 million grant for the development of the feasibility study and environmental and social impact assessment for the construction of HPP Skavica, an additional dam and a 132 MW hydropower plant, upstream from the existing Fierza HPP. The construction activities are planned to start in 2020.

The investment will provide 132 MW renewable energy, increase electricity supply security by \sim 450 GWh/year, and reduce the risk of floods on 10,000 ha, to the benefit of 100,000 people. The investment is expected to create 300 new jobs during construction and other 45 jobs in the operation stage.





BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

The WBIF has so far supported investments estimated at €2.9 billion through 25 projects across all eligible sectors. The value of signed loans exceeds €1.1 billion for a total of 20 projects.

The country has benefitted from 43 grants with an overall value of €88.2 million that cover both technical assistance and investment works for electricity distribution, hydropower generation, water supply and wastewater collection and treatment, flood protection, health, penitentiary, sports and cultural facilities, social housing, rail and road transport. Six grants (€9.1 million) for technical assistance to transport and environment projects were approved in 2017.

Supported primarily by rising domestic demand, economic growth is projected to increase from 3.1% in 2016 to 3.5% by 2019. The key economic challenge is the imbalance of an economic model that favours public sector, consumption, and imports. The fiscal and external deficits are expected to persist until 2019 when a balanced budget is foreseen to be sustained by the ongoing structural reform agenda and an ambitious fiscal adjustment. The highest risk for the medium-term outlook are political uncertainties that would slow down the reform agenda.

The transport and environment strategies were adopted in 2016 and 2017, respectively, allowing for an increased WBIF support.

WATSAN Programme in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina / 2017

The project "Water and Sanitation in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina" was launched in 2008 and aims at the development of sustainable water and sanitation services in accordance with the EU accession conditions. Priority investments from 20 municipalities have been financed under the project.

The WBIF has co-financed water/wastewater schemes and provided technical, financial and management support, alongside grants from the EU National IPA and Sida. Renewed assistance was granted in 2017, €1.3 million for the preparation of technical documentations and tender dossiers

Apart from (re)construction of water and wastewater systems, the project facilitates operational efficiency and financial sustainability of operators and increases their capacity to prepare and implement infrastructure investments.





THE FORMER YUGOSLAV REPUBLIC OF **MACEDONIA**

The WBIF has supported investments estimated at €1.2 billion through 14 projects across all eligible sectors. The value of signed loans has reached €511 million for a total of 9 projects.

The country has benefitted from 28 grants with an overall estimated value of €112.8 million that cover both technical assistance and investment works. Three grants (€72.1 million) were approved in 2017, including one for co-financing the construction of the railway line Beljakovce - Kriva Palanka on Corridor VIII (€70 million grant / project value €152.4 million).

The WBIF has supported the development of crucial infrastructure, such as the first renewables scheme in the country and improvements in electricity distribution, rehabilitation of water and sewerage systems in medium-sized municipalities, better schools, healthcare and penitentiary facilities, construction of key road and rail routes.

Affected by political uncertainty in the first half of the year, growth is expected to decline to 1.5% in 2017 but expand to 3.2 in 2018 driven by consumption and public and private investments. The fiscal deficit is expected to reach 3% of GDP in 2017. In this context, investment prioritisation and the assistance available under the WBIF are critical to delivering infrastructure projects.

Reconstruction of Penitentiary Institutions / 2017

The reform of penitentiary facilities started in 2005 and aims at overcrowding alleviation, betterment of living conditions for inmates, improvement of working environment for staff, and enhancement of safety and security systems. As part of this comprehensive programme, four penitentiary institutions have been (re)constructed and equipped with WBIF support, CEB loan funds and grants from the EU National IPA and Norway: Kumanovo Prison (operational since 2013), Skopje Prison, Idrizovo Penal Correctional Facility, and Tetovo Juvenile Educational Facility.

The WBIF has assisted with project revision and design compliance with the European Prison Rules and provided TA support for the implementation and management of the infrastructure projects, the latter renewed in 2017 through a €1.1 million grant.

The completion of all four facilities will improve the living conditions of 2,500 sentenced persons, remand prisoners and juveniles, and the working conditions of 900 staff.





The WBIF has supported investments estimated at €910 million through 19 projects across all eligible sectors. The value of signed loans has reached €232 million for a total of 10 projects.

The country has benefitted from 30 grants with an overall value of €105.9 million that cover both technical assistance and investment works. Four grants for technical assistance (€2.5 million) for infrastructure developments in the environment, social and transport sectors were approved in 2017.

The WBIF has helped build essential infrastructure that ensures provision of municipal services, such as district heating, water supply and wastewater collection and treatment as well as solid waste management, water resources conservation, upgrading of medical equipment, energy efficiency improvements, and modern road and rail transport routes.

During 2008-2016, real GDP grew on average by 3.4%, primarily due to consumption, supported by remittances and foreign aid. The SAA with the EU became active in 2016. Near-term growth is foreseen to be driven by investments and consumption.

With key investment prioritisation institutions and tools operationalised, NIC and SPP, the WBIF can further contribute to infrastructure improvements to support FDI.

Upgrading the Physical Infrastructure of Secondary and Tertiary Healthcare Institutions / 2017

The health services in Kosovo are provided through a network of primary, secondary, and tertiary healthcare institutions, which also provide basic and postgraduate medical education and carry out research activities in addition to their primary function. All secondary and tertiary healthcare facilities are organised within the Kosovo Hospital and University Clinical Services (KHUCS).

One of the major challenges faced by the country's healthcare system is the low capacity for diagnosis and treatment due to a limited budget available for medical equipment.

To improve the quality of health services and strengthen and advance diagnostics capacities in the public sector, the WBIF finances a feasibility study, including technical specifications and tender documentation, for the upgrading of medical equipment, consistent with the capacity of the medical personnel and the institutional set-up, in all fourteen secondary and tertiary health provider institutions under the KHUCS.





MONTENEGRO

The WBIF has supported investments estimated at €808 million through 14 projects across all eligible sectors. The value of signed loans has reached €178 million for a total of 4 projects.

The country has benefitted from 35 grants with a total value of €93.3 million that cover both technical assistance and investment works. Six grants (€20.3 million) were approved in 2017, including one for co-financing the construction of a new wastewater treatment plant in Podgorica (€9 million grant / project value €50.3 million).

The WBIF has helped prepare and implement essential infrastructure, such as water and wastewater systems, district heating systems, regional solid waste schemes, improved gas and electricity distribution networks, and key road and rail transport routes.

The country's economy is projected to grow by an average of 2.8% in 2017-2019 mainly due to large public investments and consumption, while the fiscal deficit is estimated to exceed 6% in 2017-2018 and then decrease to around 4% of GDP by 2019, against a background of high external vulnerability.

Under these conditions, strict prioritisation and coordination with the instruments available under the WBIF will be indispensable to deliver infrastructure developments.

Mediterranean Corridor (Road R1), Adriatic-Ionian Highway: Construction of Budva Bypass / 2017

The Adriatic-Ionian Highway (the "Blue Highway") runs along the coast of the Adriatic and Ionian Seas, from Trieste (Italy) to Kalamata (Greece), with a total length of around 1,550 km. It is an integral part of the extension of the Mediterranean Corridor into the Western Balkans, enhancing connectivity within the region, as well as between the region and the EU Member States.

With WBIF support, the construction of an alternative route for transit traffic at Budva was identified as having the highest priority for the removal of bottlenecks on this highway section. In 2017, the WBIF renewed its assistance with a €2.5 million grant for the preliminary design of the bypass. This bypass is the first section to be constructed of the highway, setting a precedent for future studies, implementation, and financing models.

The investment will be fully compliant with TEN-T standards, reduce travel time, increase road traffic, and allow for a sustainable development of the neighbouring region.






The WBIF has supported investments estimated at €4.4 billion through 31 projects across all eligible sectors. The value of signed loans exceeds €2.1 billion for a total of 19 projects.

The country has benefitted from **49 grants** with an overall value of **€140.5 million** that cover both technical assistance and investment works. Six grants (€40.7 million) were approved in 2017, including two for co-financing the modernisation of the railway line Niš - Dimitrovgrad (€28.4 million grant / €55.8 million project value) and the upgrade of Makis water and wastewater treatment facilities in Belgrade (€3 million grant / €17.9 million project value).

The WBIF has helped develop essential infrastructure, such as RDI and start-up incubator facilities, education and judiciary facilities, water supply and wastewater collection as well as treatment systems, district heating, electricity and gas transmission networks, road and rail routes, and urban transport.

The economic growth dimished substantially in the first half of 2017, which slowed down investments and increased imports. Growth is expected to pick up and reach 3-4% over the medium term, mainly due to investments driven by business positive reforms and consumption recovery. The WBIF supports strategic infrastructure delivery backed up by investment prioritisation.

Orient/East-Med Corridor (Road R7): Construction of Niš - Merdare Highway, Section Niš (Merošina) - Pločnik (Beloljin) / 2017

Niš - Merdare Highway is a priority project aimed at improving connectivity in the Western Balkans, both for people and the economy by facilitating regional cohesion, cooperation, and trade. The road does not only link Niš to Pristina (the "Peace Highway"), but is also the main connection with the Pan-European Corridors IV and X, Route 6 (Skopje - Pristina) and Route 2b (Sarajevo - Podgorica – Vlora). The WBIF has therefore provided timely technical assistance to advance its maturity from pre-feasibility study to detail design, the latter through a grant of €4.8 million approved in 2017.

The investment entails the construction of 32.6 km of half-motorway profile compliant with the TEN-T standards, as an integral part of the extension of the Orient/East-Med Corridor to the Western Balkans. It intends to optimise performance, increase capacity and road safety, and generate economic, social and environmental benefits, including through the creation of around 400 jobs during construction and operation.





REGIONAL GRANTS

Regional projects, i.e those benefitting more than one country and facilitating regional cooperation, are at the core of WBIF's mandate, with an overall **estimated investment volume** of more than €1.5 billion through 23 projects supported by 30 grants for a total of €120.2 million.

Regional transport as well as electricity and gas connections account for most of the portfolio, followed by financing facilities for energy efficiency (REEP and REEP Plus), SME support (WB EDIF), and technical assistance for sector studies concerning the preparation and financing of future investment projects across all eligible sectors.

Regional Study for Voltage Profile Improvement / 2017

Overvoltage in steady-state regime has been identified as a critical occurrence in the transmission systems in the WB6 region, causing rapid aging of the equipment, disruption of the supply, and large economic costs.

As a first step in ensuring a high reliability and operational security of the transmission systems in the region, the WBIF finances the feasibility study for the determination of the optimal solution and related investment costs for voltage regulation and reactive power compensation in the existing network as well as for future grids planned in the next 5 to 10-years.

Biomass-based Heating in the Western Balkans – A Roadmap for Sustainable Development / 2013

Biomass is the most important heating energy source in the Western Balkans, accounting for over 40% of the energy required for heating. However, a significant share of biomass is used inefficiently because of outdated equipment and the lack of wood drying before use. Apart from the loss of 40-50% of the energy content and higher energy costs of heating due to such practices, resulting particulate emissions significantly contribute to poor air quality in urban areas. To advance changes in existing practices and circumstances, improvements of policy and regulatory frameworks, as well as an increase in the volume of sustainable biomass supply accessible to the market and in the availability and performance of investments in efficient biomass-based heating technologies are all needed.

The WBIF-funded sector study presents a comprehensive roadmap of recommended actions in the short-term (until 2020), and medium to long-term (until 2030). Indeed, the study concludes that there are significant economic opportunities for investments in increased and more efficient use of biomass in the region, and the benefits outweigh the costs. The study was completed in October 2017 and was sponsored by the Energy Community Secretariat and implemented by the World Bank Group.








SECTOR REVIEW





Sector summary

Energy industries in the Western Balkans remain defined by dated infrastructure, overwhelming dominance of coal and hydropower, low energy efficiency, often low energy prices, and fragmented markets with limited cross-border trade. The potential, however, is significant. The sector could be a regional growth driver through multi-country projects, like the Southern Gas Corridor, or by tapping into a large renewable energy and energy efficiency potential, which can help achieve more energy security in the region and contribute to the countries' Paris Agreement pledges and goals.

Under their Energy Community's obligations, Albania, Kosovo, Montenegro, and Serbia have transposed the third Energy Package to a sufficient degree. Priorities now include the implementation of the Package and market integration at a regional level as well as with European markets. The 2016 list of Projects of Energy Community Interest (PECI) and Projects of Mutual Interest (PMI) focuses on regional gas and electricity connectors and supports such challenges.

WBIF priorities and actions

The WBIF works closely with the Energy Community and provides support primarily to regional connectivity and sustainable energy projects. Both technical assistance and investment grants are available, with co-financing support restricted to PECI and PMI projects.

With 59 grants for a value of €172.1 million, energy is WBIF's second most active sector. The focus is on connectivity (electricity and gas transmission) and sustainable energy (renewables and energy efficiency). Five grants (€32.7 million) were approved for energy projects in 2017, including technical assistance for voltage regulation, energy efficiency and hydropower, as well as cofinancing via REEP Plus, a regional energy efficiency programme.

Pristina District Heating Improvement Project

The district heating (DH) sector in Kosovo faces significant challenges related to ageing facilities and inadequate maintenance, meeting only 5% of the total demand. The WBIF has provided technical assistance (feasibility study, EIA, legal and regulatory support) and co-financed the investment costs for the modernisation of the DH system in Pristina. The project took the old heavy fuel oil boiler out of service and connected the system to "Kosovo B" instead. This technology is highly energy efficient and known as cogeneration, because heat can be extracted from the turbines of the power plant, while these turbines at the same time continue to generate electric power. Moreover, the district heating network was rehabilitated and extended. The project has also benefitted from €13.3 million in grant from Germany, Sida, and Luxembourg.

The main objective of the measures is to provide DH to residential, commercial and public customers reliably, at lowest possible cost, and least environmental impact. Construction works started in June 2013 and the project concluded in 2017.

Bogdanci Wind Park in the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia


The pioneer Bogdanci Wind Park was successfully developed by the Macedonian generator ELEM with WBIF support through a €0.4 million for feasibility study and impact assessment and two KfW loans.


The 16 turbines have a 36.8 MW capacity and annual production averaged 120 GWh over the first 3 years of operations (2015-2017), ahead of plan, thanks to stronger than expected summer winds. This is approximately one week of the Macedonian power production. ELEM is now considering a second phase to bring total capacity to 50 MW according to the original plan.

The project is significant from a WBIF perspective. The grant was in the first batch of awards back in 2008 when the project was in the conceptual phase. Over the intervening six years the project has moved through all the development cycle stages, becoming operational.

Sector summary

The environment in the region is affected by a poor legacy, including coal and lignite reliance, illegal waste dumping, accumulated industrial and mining waste, limited wastewater treatment, and an energy inefficient building stock. Urban areas have sprawled as well as construction for tourism along the coastlines. These put additional strain on an often-deficient municipal infrastructure, generate large investment needs, and threaten the region's rich biodiversity.

The Western Balkan region is highly vulnerable to climate change impacts. Higher summer temperatures, lower and less predictable rainfall are likely to impact water supply, hydro energy production and energy use. The investment necessary to improve the environmental situation and adapt to climate change is considerable. Financing is challenging in times of fiscal strain and the grant co-financing of selected high priority environment projects will help with developing much needed infrastructure.

WBIF priorities and actions

The WBIF's main sector priorities are water and wastewater, solid waste, as well as flood protection and river basin management in densely populated, industrialised, and environmentally sensitive areas

The sector has been allocated 65 grants for a total of €104.7 million that finance 41 projects with an estimated investment volume of €1.8 billion.

Ten grants (€21.3 million) were awarded to environment projects in 2017, of which two (€12 million) co-finance water and wastewater facilities, and eight (€9.3 million) provide TA to water and wastewater, flood protection, and waste management projects.

Regional Sanitary Landfill for Zivinice, Banovici and Kladanj in Bosnia and Herzegovina

With large parts of the EU waste *aquis* yet to be transposed and only six landfills meeting EU standards, the construction of regional sanitary landfills has been identified as a prerequisite of a systematic solution for solid waste management in the country.

The WBIF finances the supervision services for the construction of a regional sanitary landfill of 1,269,340 m3 for three municipalities in Turzla Canton (Živinice, Banovići, and Kladanj), a safer system of waste management with integrated recycling. The investment is expected to help bring current operations in the three municipalities closer to the EU requirements and reduce environmental risks posed by uncontrolled emissions and effluents from the existing open dump sites. Construction works are planned to start in 2018 and be completed in 2021.

Water Sector Performance and Investment Programme / Municipal Infrastructure V in Albania

Building on the Municipal Infrastructure Programmes I-IV, Phase V has been established by the Albanian Government and the KfW, with envisaged donor contributions from the EU and Switzerland, with the objective of increasing funding in the sector to implement priority investments identified in the National Water Supply and Sewerage Master Plan and contribute to corporate development.



Phase V envisages the implementation of €130 million in water supply, sewerage, and wastewater treatment priority infrastructure developments in up to 10 municipalities, to which WBIF contributes with a €1.4 million grant for the preparation of technical documentations.



Sector summary

Social policy development and social reform are priorities in the region. Efforts focus on education, health and pension systems, poverty reduction, social inclusion, and improvements to the social safety net. Accompanying infrastructure measures include construction and modernisation of social housing, education, health, and judicial facilities.

Progress in this sector is a vital component of the Western Balkans' efforts to align with the Europe 2020 strategy, particularly through the SEE 2020 strategy. The SEE 2020 strategy reflects the determination of South East European governments to embrace the policies required to attain the levels of socio-economic growth necessary to ensure its citizens' prosperity and facilitate integration with the EU.

WBIF priorities and actions

The WBIF liaises with the Regional Cooperation Council on social objectives. The projects in the social sector account for 17% of the total WBIF approved grants.

The sector has been allocated a total of 44 grants (€41.9 million) that support 24 projects with an estimated investment volume of €3.3 billion. These comprise preparatory work and studies for investments (feasibility studies, design, impact assessments, etc.), co-financing, and strategic studies for the construction and modernisation of education, research and cultural establishments, health and judiciary facilities, as well as social housing, and municipal and rural infrastructure.

Two new TA grants (€1.4 million) were approved in 2017, which support the modernisation of medical equipment in fourteen healthcare facilities in Kosovo and the reconstruction of penitentiary institutions in the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia.

Tirana University Hospital Centre Reform Programme (Phase 2) in Albania

Tirana University Hospital is the most important tertiary medical facility in Albania, functioning as hospital, education institution, and research centre. This facility is the largest hospital in the country with a bed capacity of approximately 1,450 beds, and serves 65,000 patients every year.

The investments were foreseen to be implemented in several stages. The first phase covered the construction of a new main building for the hospital including an emergency unit, radiology, intensive care, laboratories, central sterilisation, and functional diagnostics. The second phase consists of two additional floors on the main building and the rehabilitation of the General Medicine Building.

The WBIF provided a €580,000 grant to support the preparation of the feasibility study, including environmental impact assessment, and an energy supply study. The grant also provided for training on maintenance and waste management.

Schools Modernisation Programme in Serbia

The School Modernisation Programme is aimed at improving the quality of learning conditions at all levels of pre-university education, increase equity in the education system and provide for a more efficient allocation of investments in physical infrastructure. It focuses on the renewal/construction of school infrastructure and supports the strategic development of the education system through technical assistance.


The WBIF provided €400,000 interest subsidy on the CEB loan, and €400,000 technical assistance for the development and implementation of the Education Sector Strategy, of an education management and information system, and support in the investment decision-making process for large-scale education infrastructure.


The project contributes to the increase in enrolment in secondary education and to improving the quality of education. Besides supporting growth and productivity, these investments are instrumental in poverty reduction through better access to education.

Sector summary

Despite an investment volume of €13.5 billion since 2004, the Western Balkans' transport network still requires focused financing. 23% of the region's comprehensive road network needs rehabilitation, and the condition of the rail infrastructure necessitates significant improvements. Further, non-physical impediments that affect trade and traffic in the region must be addressed.

In 2015, the leaders of the Western Balkans adhered to and agreed on a regional Core transport network and an indicative extension of the EU Core Network and Corridors to enhance connectivity within the WB6 and further with the EU network. The signing of the Transport Community Treaty in 2017 encourages a better planning of transport investments and streamlining of procedures.

The South-East Europe Transport Observatory (SEETO) estimated a total of €13.9 billion priority projects in the region. Current investment needs are thus significant and require effective prioritisation in times of limited fiscal flexibility. In addition, a set of connectivity reform measures, which was agreed together with the Core Network, is being implemented to maximise the benefits of this investment effort.

WBIF priorities and actions

The WBIF provides TA grants to develop projects that are part of the Core network. Investment grants co-finance construction of projects on the Core Corridors, making use of an allocation of €1 billion available for key connectivity investments over the 2015-2020 period. The WBIF also liaises with SEETO to progress the implementation of the connectivity reform measures.

With 84 grants for a value of €412.6 million to 46 projects, transport is WBIF's most active sector. Rail and road are the two largest beneficiaries. Fourteen TA grants (€26.1 million) and two investment grants (€98.4 million) were awarded to transport projects in 2017.

Orient/East-Med Corridor (Road R6a), Construction of A4 Skopje - Blace Motorway, Section Interchange Stenkovec - Blace

The project concerns the upgrade to motorway standards of the existing road between Skopje and Blace (12.4 km), from Stenkovec Interchange (Skopje bypass) to Blace, the border crossing point with Kosovo. This road is part of the indicative extension of the TEN-T Core Network (Orient/East-Med Corridor) in the Western Balkans, Route 6a, which runs between Ribarevina (Montenegro), Ribarice (Serbia), Pristina and on to Skopje, connecting Routes 4 and 7 with Corridor VIII.

The WBIF has provided €2 million in grants to prepare the technical documentation for the project, from feasibility study to construction tender documents.

This investment has a vital role in the economic and social development of the north-east region of the country, and facilitates international transport and trade in the region, linking markets to the Port of Thessaloniki. It will ensure a direct, safer and faster traffic link between Skopje and Pristina, as well as reduce fuel consumption, travel time, and emissions.

Orient/East-Med Corridor (Rail R4): Reconstruction and Modernisation of Bar - Vrbnica Railway Line in Montenegro


The extension of the Orient/East-Med Corridor in the Western Balkans along Route 4 is approximately 580 km long and runs from Vrsac (Serbia – Romania border) to Belgrade (Serbia) and then to Podgorica and Bar (Montenegro). Bar – Vrbnica (the latter at the Montenegro – Serbia border) is the most important section of the Montenegrin rail network, carrying about 20% of all passengers and about 60% of freight.


The EU, through the WBIF and National IPA, has allocated more than €13 million to the preparation of investment packages as well as to urgent rehabilitation works. In addition, under the Connectivity Agenda, the EU has allocated €20 million to cover 50% of the costs associated with the installation of signalling and telecommunication systems in Podgorica as well as to the rehabilitation of 29 concrete bridges and 20 tunnels.


